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Research partnerships (RP)

Involve

building relationships,
mutual cooperation
sharing tasks

In order to:

enhance research capacity
attain common goals
produce and share innovative knowledge

develop new lines of research supported by new synergies *(Craveiro et al, 2017, Farnman et al, 2015)*.

**Therefore, the way partnerships are built & sustained should be a common concern of
FUNDERS & RESEARCH INSTITUTIONS**

Not surprisingly, over the past twenty years,
development of guidelines,
good standards of practice,
ethical regulations and
recommendations on transboundary research
partnerships (*ESSENCE, 2014; KFPE, 2014; CCGHR, 2016*).

But no systematic framework to evaluate RP in practice



COHRED's RFI

- **evidence based tool** that operationalizes **good practice standards** related to three main dimensions of partnerships
 - fairness of opportunity,
 - fair process and
 - fair sharing of benefits, costs and outcomes *(COHRED, 2017; Ijsselmuiden and Klipp, 2017; Carvalho et al 2017; Carvalho, Nunes and Hartz, 2017; Craveiro and Hartz, 2017)*
- requires adhering institutions to develop a strategy to “improve” their behavior in RP – RFI Logo granted for a period of 2 years – institutional change must take place
- IHMT-NOVA was first **partner of COHRED's RFI**.
 - among Portuguese language Institutions
 - among European Academic Institution



RP at NOVA-IHMT

- NOVA-IHMT
 - key institution in Portugal and in the Community of Portuguese Speaking Countries in terms of health for development, health systems strengthening, infectious tropical diseases, global health, education & training
 - strongly engaged in RP between Latin America, Europe and Africa since its foundation in 1902
 - Undergoing process of revision of management and laboratory processes
 - **COHRED's RFI provided** tool to go beyond mere good intentions or discussions,
 - reviewing our partnership processes and systematizing our ongoing efforts to establish fair partnerships with our collaborating institutions – **INTERNAL** positioning.
 - structuring with our partners the dialogue about what our partnerships should look like – **EXTERNAL** positioning.

Fair Research Partnerships

- University Development and Innovation – Africa (UDI-A) - mobility and empowerment of African academics, the establishment of North/South research partnerships and the strengthening of African institutions.
- *WIDENING-TWINNING* project in partnerships with COHRED and SDU - develop the field of 'fair RP' and foster the implementation of standards and good practices related to the RFI.





External RFI advocacy/implementation will build on:

- **Members from partner institutions from the Global South belonging to IHMT's Administration Board, Advisory Council & Scientific Advisory Board**
- **Institutional partnerships with Universities in Angola, Brazil, Cape Verde, Mozambique and East Timor**
 - NOVA-IHMT incorporates academic staff from those Universities as Invited Professors
 - NOVA-IHMT staff
 - serving as Invited Professors at those Universities,
 - participating in Scientific Councils and
 - delocalizing training programs from Portugal to Angola, Brazil and Cape Verde.
- Membership of several networks, namely
 - within the CPLP (Community of Portuguese Speaking Countries)
 - within the European Union , such as TropEd
 - globally, such as IANPHI and CUGH

Ethical and Moral Impact

- Good practice standards (as structured by RFI) are a certain subset of ethical obligations
- Help to mobilize ethical capital as part of an organisations' brand management strategies
- Hence, RFI guides institutions towards ethical actions that reconfigure member's perceptions of their moral obligations
- It does so by changing morally relevant facts and circumstances, e.g.
 - changing people's expectations regarding opportunity, process and sharing of benefits,
 - providing new options.



Concluding remarks

- We are still in the early days of the RFI but we need to assess its real impact on partnerships – how does it benefit LMICs?
- Development of a metric/protocol/indicators to “evaluate” the RFI
- It fostered an institution-wide discussion at the IHMT/NOVA with practical implications (implementation of new research management processes)
- Need for reflection on the adequate business model
- IHMT/NOVA and CPLP spearheading the incorporation of the COHRED’s RFI as a model to support the transition towards fair partnerships, aligned with the SDG17
- Need recognition and support from funders and research institutions

SDG 17 - strengthening “the means of implementation and revitalize the global partnership for sustainable development”.
